

Reading

The children must:

- know the 44 sounds that English is made up of and be able to recognise the corresponding letter or group of letters, sometimes using picture clues to help
- be able to use 'Fred Talk' to read simple words
- read from a range of fiction and non-fiction books using their sound knowledge
- be able to read the first 45 high frequency words 'on sight'
- to be able to identify and continue simple rhymes (mat, cat, sat, etc.) and alliterative patterns (bouncing ball, dirty dog, clever cat, shiny ship, etc.)
- be able to talk about what they have read with understanding
- be able to predict what might happen next in a story
- be able to identify the start and end of sentences

Sight Words

I can read words with contractions [E.g. I'm, I'll, we'll] & understand the apostrophe reps the missing letter(s).

Retrieving Information

I can remember and discuss what I have read. I can retell familiar stories.

Interpret Information

I can discuss the significance of a title and events in texts. I can make simple predictions about what might happen next.

Features of text:

I can recognise rhymes and poems and can recite some by heart. I can distinguish between fiction and non-fiction books.

<u>Writing</u>

I can spell most common exception words. I can spell the days of the week.

I can name the letters of the alphabet in order.

I can write in full sentences.

Handwriting

I can sit correctly at a table, holding a pencil comfortably and correctly. I am beginning to form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place.

I can form capital letters and digits 0-9.

Grammar

I can use the joining words 'and' or 'but' in my sentences. I can use some describing words in my sentences.

Punctuation

I can use full stops at the end of sentences. I use a capital letter to begin a sentence. I use capital letters for names and I. I use finger spaces between words.

<u>Maths</u>

Number and place value

I can count forwards to and across 100.
I can count backwards to and across 100.
I can read numbers up to 20 in words.
I can write numbers up to 20 in words.
I can read numbers up to 100 in numerals.
I can write numbers up to 100 in numerals.
I can find one more than a number – up to 100.
I can find one less than a number – up to 100.
I can count in twos.
I can count in fives.
I can count in tens.

Calculation

I know number bonds to 10 / 20.
I can add I digit numbers to 20, including zero.
I can add I digit and 2 digit numbers to 20, including zero.
I can subtract I digit numbers to 20, including zero.
I can subtract I digit and 2 digit numbers to 20, including zero.

Measurement

I can tell the time to the hour. I can tell the time to half past the hour.
